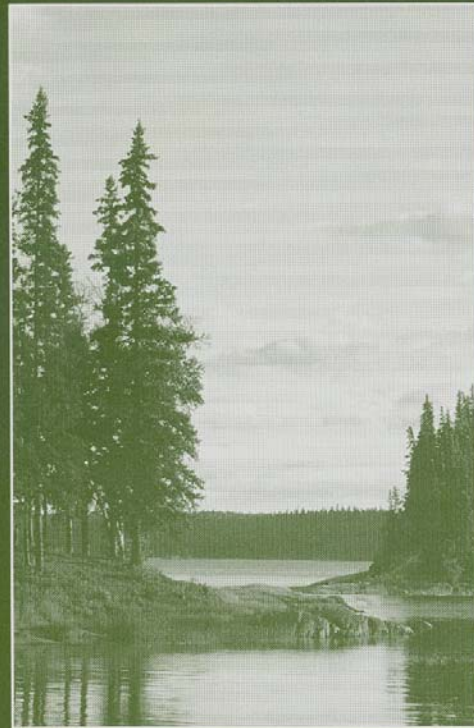

## *Role and Responsibilities*

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Under *The Environment Act* (1988) the Clean Environment Commission provides a process through which the public can participate in the environmental decision making process in Manitoba. The Commission also provides advice and recommendations to the provincial Conservation Minister with respect to environmental issues and licensing matters.

Commission membership includes a full-time Chairperson and part-time Commissioners appointed by Order-in Council. Members come from a wide variety of occupations and reside in different regions of the province.

The Commission utilizes the following mechanisms to assist in the environmental management process:

### **Public Hearings**

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During the environmental assessment process, the public is invited to submit comments and/or objections respecting a proposed development project. In response to valid concerns, the Conservation Minister can ask the Clean Environment Commission to convene a public hearing. During such a hearing the Commission would receive representations from the project proponent, the general public - both supporters and opponents, and from the various government departments responsible for reviewing the proposal. The Commission reviews the evidence and information presented at

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the hearing and prepares a report containing advice and recommendations for the Minister. Upon receipt of the Commission's report, the Minister may choose to accept all or part of its recommendations but is under no legal obligation to do so. If, however, the Commission's recommendations are not acted upon, or incorporated into the licence under review, written reasons must be provided by the Minister or the Environment Department and these must be filed in the Public Registry.

### **Environmental Mediation**

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Conflicts can occur when two opposing but environmentally sound ideas are proposed for the same location or resource. Providing all parties agree, the Commission can provide environmental mediation services to resolve these conflicts.

### **Investigations**

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*The Environment Act* allows the Commission to investigate any matter of environmental concern and to provide advice and recommendations to the Conservation Minister.

## Message from the Chairman

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The Commission has been involved in some interesting activities this past year. In addition to convening a number of public hearings, which will be reported on in subsequent editions of this series, the Commission undertook a major consultation exercise surrounding the development of environmental impact assessment guidelines, completed an alternate dispute resolution process, and sponsored a large public education forum. All of these activities demonstrate the broad application of the Commission's full mandate, one that includes mediation exercises, consultation processes beyond the public hearing, and public awareness initiatives. They demonstrate the government's commitment to an active, innovative, and relevant environmental Commission for Manitobans.

The public consultation exercise that the Commission undertook to assist Manitoba Conservation in the development of environmental impact assessment guidelines for the *Wuskwatim Generation and Transmission Project* represented a first for Manitobans. Through a series of public meetings organized to encourage and facilitate public comment on draft environmental assessment guidelines, the Commission was able to gather and subsequently report on the issues, concerns, and priorities that Manitobans felt required consideration when preparing an assessment of a major development project. The Commission commends the Department of Conservation for initiating this cooperative program of advance public consultation and anticipates that the

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beneficial results of the effort should be evident when the final environmental assessment of the project is filed.

The Commission was also permitted an opportunity to explore the mediation component of its mandate through the coordination and supervision of the *Rothsay Rendering - Area Residents* alternate dispute resolution process. This fascinating exercise, that brought local residents and a major animal processing firm together to discuss issues and concerns, resulted in the resolution of many outstanding local grievances and the creation of a long-term consultation mechanism through which future problems can be addressed. This mediation approach represents yet another useful tool in the arsenal of effective public participation and consultation instruments. The Commission was pleased to have been a part of this exciting effort.

Finally, the sponsorship of a public forum respecting the protection and effective stewardship of our freshwater resources allowed the Commission an opportunity to engage a large number of citizens in discussions surrounding a critically important issue that faces all Canadians.

All in all, a good year for the Commission and hopefully, by extension, for the people of Manitoba.

## Hearings

During the 2002-03 fiscal year, the Commission conducted one public hearing respecting the City of Winnipeg's Wastewater Collection and Treatment System. While this hearing was convened in January 2003, it was not completed, nor were the recommendations emanating from the proceedings conveyed to the Minister of Conservation, during the 2002-03 reporting year. Accordingly, the details and results of this hearing will be provided in subsequent reports of this series.

## Investigations

The Commission did not undertake any "Investigations", as defined under Section 6(5)(c) of the Environment Act, during the 2002/03 fiscal year.

## Environment Mediation

### Maple Leaf Foods (Rothsay Rendering) - St. Boniface Area Residents Mediation

On February 26, 2001 the Minister of Conservation requested that the Commission investigate the possibility of pursuing a mediation exercise to address the ongoing dispute between Maple Leaf Foods Ltd. and residents in the St. Boniface area of Winnipeg with respect to odour emissions from the Rothsay Rendering plant on Dawson Road.

In response, the Commission scheduled a series of exploratory meetings with area residents, representatives of the Company, and relevant government regulatory officials to explore the issue and determine an appropriate process through which the matter could be addressed. These exploratory discussions resulted in an agreement on the part of all parties to form a group that would meet regularly to develop a mutually acceptable plan for reducing the odour problem. It was agreed that the Commission would coordinate and serve to facilitate these meetings but that the agenda and direction of the meetings would be determined cooperatively by the group as a whole.

Over a period of 18 months, the group met on seven separate occasions to first review and discuss the nature and magnitude of the problem and then to review and evaluate plans for its resolution. These meetings included participation and presentations by various technical experts, consultants and government officials. From these meetings emerged a specific plan for mitigation of the odour problem through a significant plant and equipment modification program. In addition, a broadly based community communication strategy was implemented so as to keep area residents informed about the progress of the group's attempts at resolving this long-standing issue.

In November 2002 all parties in the group agreed that the problem had been substantially resolved. Furthermore, with the key issues addressed, it was agreed that the formal mediation process was no longer required. The parties resolved that their working relationship, and the communication strategy that had been established



during the mediation process, could be maintained so as to permit an ongoing dialogue between the parties. It was further agreed that this ongoing dialogue would not require the Commission's continued direct involvement. The group prepared and signed a closing statement.

In summary, the Commission considers this mediation exercise to have been a successful foray into the field of alternate dispute resolution. The odour issue that was the focus of the effort has been addressed to the satisfaction of area residents, the Company (Maple Leaf Foods/Rothsay) and Manitoba Conservation. A process and structure for a continued dialogue between the parties has been established along with a commitment on the part of all parties to continue working together to manage the ongoing relationship between the Company and the community of which it is a part.

## *Special Projects*

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### **Freshwater Forum**

On February 18, 2003 the Commission, working in partnership with Fisheries and Oceans Canada (Freshwater Institute) and Manitoba Conservation, sponsored a public forum respecting Freshwater. The purpose of the forum, scheduled in recognition of 2003 having been declared the International Year of Freshwater by the United Nations, was to encourage public discussion about the many issues surrounding the protection and wise use and conservation of our freshwater resources. Over 650 people representing a broad cross-section of the Manitoba population attended the forum.

The Forum included keynote addresses by Science Journalist Bob McDonald of CBC Radio's Quirks and Quarks, renowned researcher David Schindler of the University of Alberta, and Richard Coombe of the New York State Watershed Agricultural Council. In addition, a series of interactive workshops featured contributions from a variety of local and national authorities on freshwater. The Minister of Conservation, The Honourable Steve Ashton, offered the luncheon address.

**Public Meetings:**  
*Draft Environmental Impact Statement  
Guidelines for the Wuskwatim Generation  
and Transmission Projects*

At the request of the Minister of Conservation the Commission convened a series of public meetings on the draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) guidelines for the proposed Wuskwatim Generation and Transmission projects as proposed by Manitoba Hydro and the Nisichawayasihk Cree Nation. The sessions were held in Thompson, Nisichawayasihk Cree Nation (Nelson House), Opaskwayak Cree Nation (The Pas) and Winnipeg, and were attended by over 220 people including First Nation organizations, environmental groups, businesses, consultants, local residents and students. The Commission received written submissions and oral statements, and heard numerous questions and comments on the guidelines. Summaries were prepared after each meeting and they were posted on the Commission's Web site.

Participants at the Commission's public meetings expressed various comments and concerns about the draft EIS guidelines for the proposed Wuskwatim projects. They were both supportive and critical of the guidelines, but generally supported the proactive approach taken by government to consult prior to finalizing the guidelines. First Nation representatives spoke about how past hydroelectric projects in northern Manitoba have affected their lands, resources, and way of life, and of the importance of including Aboriginal traditional knowledge in the conduct of environmental assessments. They asked that the geographic scope of the assessment be expanded to

include areas affected by previous hydroelectric projects as well as areas potentially affected by the Wuskwatim projects. First Nation representatives also commented on the importance of baseline information and environmental monitoring.

Environmental organizations requested that the EIS guidelines outline the environmental policy framework for the environmental assessment, establish standards of practice to be achieved and require that the effects of climate change be addressed. They questioned the need and purpose for the projects and suggested that alternatives to the projects and demand side management be considered during the environmental assessment. Several of the participants also commented that the guidelines did not provide specific direction in areas such as environmental assessment methods, cumulative effects assessment and public consultation requirements.

In early April 2002 the Commission provided a report to the Minister of Conservation containing advice and recommendations respecting the EIS guidelines for the Wuskwatim projects. In total, nineteen separate recommendations were provided on the guidelines. These included:

- Improved comprehension, greater level of specification and enhanced definition of Manitoba's environmental policy framework.
- Assessment of the Wuskwatim projects in relation to other hydroelectric developments in northern Manitoba and provision of more descriptive information on the proposed projects.

- Broader geographic scope of the environmental assessment, establishment of baseline conditions, assessment of both direct and indirect effects, support of environmental monitoring programs, use of Aboriginal traditional knowledge and adoption of best practice standards.
- Consideration of the effects of the project on climate change, and the effects of climate change on the project's operation over the longer term.
