My husband and I have owned 77 acres of land in the R.M. of Lorne for the past 17 years. The Durand's are situated 1/2 mile from us and several years ago opened a hog operation which holds 5000 hogs. The unlined lagoon was built about 300 meters from a waterway which is a subsidiary to the Boyne River. The lagoon was built to accommodate manure for 10,000 hogs. The reason for this is that they knew there would most likely be an expansion of their operation. We were not informed of this in any way. No consideration was given to us or how this would affect our air quality, water supply and our property value.

In 2006 we received a letter from the municipality of South Norfolk which is where the hog barn is located, stating there will be a meeting for a conditional use permit to construct 2 more barns and add 5000 hogs to the operation. In preparation for the meeting we obtained the TRC report and read through it. The map within the report showed our property and our neighbours property appearing to be jointly owned and vacant. There is a house on each property and has been subdivided for well over 25 years. We feel very strongly that this was a sneaky way to try to show that the barns would not affect these 2 separate properties with 2 separate land titles. The TRC states that 10,600 gallons of water per day is needed for this new operation. Our wells have been fine until the start of this hog operation and now one well is dried out. The other well has dropped 2 feet.

SO obviously THE WATER TABLE will drop even further with the increased use to run this hog bank.

I have spent many hours speaking with Bill Harrison, Ruth Pusner, Doug Sisson, Ted Ross and Colleen Thiesen who are people who have put a tremendous amount of time and energy for over 7 years to make our government see that this excessive amount of manure going into unlined lagoons which are allowed to be 300 meters from a waterway that affects in our case the water supply to Carman is totally unacceptable.

The one thing that all of these people and numerous others made clear to me is that our government is not listening to our concerns. I'm sad to say that they were absolutely right, and I believe that a healthy future for LAKE WINNIPEG is not too likely!
